B. HALL FORMS CHOIR


A new talent group, bearing the name of the Choraleers, has been formed at Hamilton.

After teaching physiology a few years, Mrs. Clemensen decided there was a real need for a new textbook on the subject. As a result, there appeared in 1941 the first edition of "Your Health and Safety," of which she and Professor La Porte of U.S.C. are co-authors. (The third edition came out just last week.)

Dr. Clemensen is sponsor of the Sursum Corda Bible Club, which was first organized in 1943 by a group of students who wanted to learn more about different religions and promote better understanding among people of all faiths.

Since Dr. Clemensen teaches physiology, one might suppose it to be her main interest, but she says, "After retiring, I'll probably spend the rest of my life baking." Her interests do vary though, and cover a lot of territory. She especially enjoys gardening, horseback riding, reading, and does a great deal of ocean swimming — humm—guess teachers really are human after all!

J. Zimbrott Speaks To Circle Francais

Joseph Zimbrott, speaking at a recent French Club meeting, described his five years at the University of Paris, where he was preparing for his doctor's degree. After his long absence from the United States, he stated, customs seemed strange to him. He was surprised at the vast amount of cars on the street and at the teen-agers, because they have so much freedom.

Mr. Zimbrott spoke about student life in Paris. He said that since no roll is taken and no work is required, except passing the final exam, many of the students stay home or at their favorite sidewalk cafe and listen to their professors' lectures over the radio. As exam time draws near, the Latin Quarters become deserted.

"There are no student activities at the University, no newspaper, no athletics, and no school plays," Mr. Zimbrott said, "yet in Paris one may attend the opera for only forty cents and see the best plays for very little. One is very happy on very little money."

Mr. Zimbrott is a cousin of Joe Grossman, co-editor of the Federalist and editor of the Olympian classbook.

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
